Clergy Economic Initiative

id you know that according to the U.S. Department of Labor, the average clergy person in the U.S. earns \$46, 150? A recent survey of clergy in the Indiana Region revealed that nearly 28% have more than \$30,000 in educational loans. 50% of Indiana congregations do not provide health care for their clergy. These statistics represent the pressing need and wonderful opportunity for clergy to receive relief from some of their financial challenges. Enter...the FLOURISH! Project, where clergy and congregations may find financial peace for today and hope for tomorrow.

The Christian Church in Indiana has just completed its first round of grants for the FLOURISH! Project made available through a generous grant from Lilly Endowment Inc. The grants provide funds to be applied toward debt relief, health care or retirement while offering a financial education through the Financial Literacy Academy. The structure of the grants allow clergy and lay leaders to partner together in receiving financial empowerment as pastoral and congregational leaders attend various components of the financial literacy training together.



Based on the FLOURISH!
Project's initiatives, sixteen
(16) Compensation Support
Grants (for congregations),
twenty-seven (27) Financial
Relief Grants (for individuals)
will be available to clergy over
the next three years. While the
grant programs have eligibility
criteria, all clergy may attend
the Financial Literacy Academy
offered in partnership with the
Pension Fund.

Disciples from Congo-Brazzaville Welcomed

he Indiana Region of the Christian
Church (Disciples of Christ) extended
an extravagant welcome to families from
our partner church—The Church of
the Disciples of Christ in Congo (EDCC)
located in Congo-Brazzaville. Their arrival was
made possible through Church World Service,
United Nations High Commission on Refugees,
the U.S. government and Exodus, a refugee
agency in Indianapolis.

Regional Minister Rick Spleth accompanied three separate delegations of Disciples to the Indianapolis International airport to receive our friends. In November of last year, Beaujacques (Bojack) Ilondo, a young gentleman who sang in one of the EDCC choirs, was the first to arrive. Pastor Jean Baptiste Ilondo, his wife Blande and three children arrived in December. Docta Ilondo, wife Esther and four children arrived late February. They have been warmly received by several congregations in and near Indianapolis.

The Ilondos were members of the Disciples of Christ Church in Congo (CDCC) in the Equator Region. Originally from a village between Boende and Wema, they lived in

Greetings from Jerusalem!

s I write I am currently in the Middle East with a group of Disciples Regional Ministers and United Church of Christ Conference Ministers and others visiting our Global Ministries staff in the Middle East and the many partners whose mission we support. I am happy to report that the investment our congregations are making through Disciples Mission Fund, the Easter offering, and Week of Compassion is being well used. Again and again I have been impressed at the comprehensive way in which our own staff and our mission partners are accomplishing great things in providing ministerial education, university education, vocational training, and kindergartens. They are literally saving youth from a life of despair, they are




helping women find dignity and power, and they are fostering interfaith relations in ways that are a model for other parts of the world. They are serving the refugees, who exist in far too great a number, with dignity and care. I am very proud of what we are doing and encourage your support.

My heart is heavy at the same time with what I have seen. We have been to

Palestinian refugee camps that have been existence since 1949 and to Syrian refugee camps that are just a few months old. The living conditions in each are intolerable. The Syrians we met left homes and jobs because of the danger of a raging war and are now living in UN tents in the desert in Northern Jordan just a few miles from the Syrian Border. They are barely getting by with no basic sanitary support. In all the camps half of the population is children.

I also saw the Wall. I knew about the Wall, of course, as I am sure you do. It is a separation barrier between Israel and the West Bank which is under Israeli occupation. Diane and I lived in Jerusalem for a time in the summer of 2000, prior to the Wall's construction, and several times a week we would walk back and



forth from Jerusalem to Bethlehem which sit side by side. Now a 30 foot wall and extensive and controlled check points block that easy access. The Wall is ugly as sin. The Wall is sin—brokenness and division of the human family.

Jesus' time in Jerusalem also filled him with a heavy spirit. "As he came near the city, he wept over it, saying, "If you, even you, had only recognized



on this day the things that make for peace." Luke 19:41-42

I am not optimistic about the future of the Middle East. Things are way broken here. I am hopeful though. I hold on to hope even when optimism seems unwarranted. I am hopeful because of the young woman I met in the Syrian Refugee Camp, a former law student from Damascus, who has created a one room school in a tent. I am hopeful because



I met Radwa Salah in Lebanon who is working with Syrian refugee youth to provide them with conflict management and peacemaking skills which they will

need to have for the day that the war ends. I am hopeful because I met Wafa Goussous in Jordan who is designing imaginative ways to give refugee women economic opportunity and address their sense of privacy and dignity. I have hope because I met Andrea Zaki in Egypt who is improving the lives of countless families with microcredit loans allowing them to start small businesses. And I

> have hope because I met Mitri Raheb in Palestine who is raising his voice with clarity and conviction about the need for the occupation of the West Bank to end.

> All of them are equipped for the work that they do because of the offerings we make. They need more than that though. They need us to be better informed about their challenge. You can start by exploring the wealth of resources at the website for the Global Ministries Middle East Initiative: www.

globalministries.org/meinitiative You can also start by reviving your prayers for Jerusalem and the whole Middle East and all its inhabitants,

Christians, Muslims, and Jews, that they might know God's peace. "If I forget you, O Jerusalem, let my right hand wither! Let my tongue cling to the roof of my mouth, if I do not remember you, if I do not set Jerusalem above my highest joy. Psalm 137:5-6 🕇

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A Green Chalice Story

outh Side Christian Church of Kokomo led the way as the first Indiana Green Chalice congregation when they were qualified in 2012. Tonia Sherrod learned about Green Chalice at about the same time their pastor, Rev. Rebecca Sundquist, did. Darrell Sherrod, who had been a "cardcarrying" environmentalist for many years, was gratified to discover that there was an organized movement within the Disciples of Christ that reconciled the denomination's spiritual values and environmental concerns. And they got started.

The congregation was already working on some initiatives, but began to do many more. Darrell speaks of the realization that there were a number of wasteful energy practices which were impacting the congregation's budget. So he took on the project of replacing incandescent light bulbs with CFLs. Other efforts included replacing electrical components, such as refrigerators, furnaces and air conditioners, which were more energy efficient, recycling paper, plastic (including communion cups), aluminum soft drink cans, and fluorescent light tubes. Also there were "common-sense" daily measures, such as thermostat monitoring, weatherstripping, etc.

The Sherrods found the main challenge was in changing old, established habits and mind-sets. Not all members of the congregation have readily accepted the necessity of certain changes. But framing the argument as a financial saving has certainly helped. Other members, especially younger ones, join in the understanding that these actions are an expression of moral concern and spiritual duty.

But Darrell states as a word of advice, "If we can do it, anyone can." Thank you, friends from South Side Christian Church, for sharing your experiences. †




Southside Christian Church Creates a Giving Tree

Holy Place Gets New Lease on Life

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embers of the small congregation on the east side of Indianapolis knew something wasn't right. Due to a lack of young families, much of the education space in Eastgate Christian Church was going unused except for the occasional Bible study class and monthly board meetings, and they were troubled by a sense that God was calling them to do and be more in the Holy Place they had inhabited since 1957. But what would that look like?

A vision began to take shape in 2014 when it occurred to Eastgate Pastor Tod Iseminger and other church leaders that their space could be used better by others outside their immediate congregation. So, they went looking for and found a potential partner in Stillwaters Adult Day Care that operates out of space attached to Castleton United Methodist Church, which oversees its operation. Stillwaters was as attracted to the idea of expanding their services to the east side of the city as Eastgate Christian Church was to finding new mission and purpose for their unused space.

Perhaps it was fortuitous that in the spring of 2015, Eastgate leaders attended JumpStart Indiana, cohosted by DCEF, the Indiana Region of the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) and the Episcopal Church Building Fund. The day-long event focused on the creative use of buildings to enhance mission and ministry. At

JumpStart, Rev. Iseminger spoke with DCEF Advisor Jim Michel about the possibility of sharing space in their facility, perhaps with Stillwaters. A month later, Jim was onsite at Eastgate to discuss needed changes to the building to accommodate licensed adult day care and the possibility of a DCEF loan to fund that renovation.

Long story short: Once the vision became clear, Eastgate Christian Church developed a business plan and signed a lease agreement with Castleton United Methodist Church/Stillwaters Adult Day Care to provide needed services to seniors in the church's immediate neighborhood. Before the year was out, DCEF approved the church's loan request and the project was off and running.

Rev. Iseminger is excited about the "new lease" on life that this new ministry provides for his congregation. "This new adult care program will allow Eastgate to serve its neighborhood in a way that we are currently not doing," he explains, "and will provide volunteering opportunities for Eastgate members and other churches in the area. There is new energy in our congregation as a result of a renewed sense of purpose." Jim Michel agrees, "Eastgate is an excellent example of what can happen to a congregation when they do a new thing with their 'place' for all the right reasons. "He adds, "DCEF is honored to be a part of this transformation." †

Solar Panels on Downey Avenue Christian Church in Indianapolis

On October 8, 2015, the 28 new solar panels began producing electricity for Downy Avenue Christian Church on the east side of Indianapolis. They were installed after the congregation received a grant from the Indiana Office of Energy Development with the assistance of Hoosier Interfaith Power and Light. A dedication service for the panels was held on October 18, with the Interim pastor, Steven Moore, standing on the roof beside the panels. Each panel produces 285 watts of energy. It is anticipated that the yearly energy bill will be reduced by at least 20%. †





Updates and a Call for Help

The Christian Church in Indiana is 8 years into our partnership with the Mbandaka Post in the Democratic Republic of Congo, and there is much to share.

Our region has welcomed three of many refugee Disciples families from the Congo. These families have fled the Republic of Congo, and are immigrating to the U.S. now that they have received official UN status as refugees. We anticipate that there may be as many as five more Disciples families coming in the future.



The Exodus Refugee program provides major assistance to these families, but as you can imagine, this is an exciting opportunity for us to extend Hoosier hospitality to these brothers and sisters in Christ. Several congregations have provided contact persons to assist with the effort; if your congregation wants to help, and has not yet provided a contact name, please reach out to Susan McNeely via email at kyvoyageur@gmail.com or by phone at 317-514-7617.

Secondly, two of our partners from Mbandaka will be joining us at Regional Assembly this fall. Rev. ILUMBE Ndjongo Bernard, Principal Supervising Pastor of Mbandaka Post (equivalent to Regional Minister) and PEKOMBE Ikinga Oscar, Secretary of the Partnership Committee of Mbandaka, They will arrive in September and be available to visit various congretaions while they are in the USA.



The Congo Task Force, which assists in all things related to the Congo partnership, is in need of additional members to assist with our ongoing projects. If you have a calling to be part of this exciting ministry, please contact Sarah Riester at the regional office, sarah@indianadisciples.org).

Finally, please keep the Disciples of Christ in Congo, and particularly the Mbandaka Post, in your continuing prayers. Massive flooding has been experienced along the Congo River, along which many Mbandaka churches are located. This has made it impossible for a number of churches to meet, and has placed a severe strain on the finances of local churches. Any financial assistance you might want to offer can be offered as a designated gift through the Christian Church in Indiana, by check or on-line offering.

Here is a "Together" story from Donna Herring, Pastor at Madison Christian Church, Frankton.

First Christian Church in Alexandria, First Christian Church in Gas City and Madison Christian Church in Frankton have joined together in a partnership for planning future ministries. Representatives of the churches and the pastors have been meeting on a regular basis to discuss the book Real Good Church by Rev. Molly Phinney Baskette. The meetings began in September of 2015 and after completing the three required meetings the group felt a common bond and decided to continue gathering for discussion, encouragement, and accountability. The group has enjoyed meeting at each of the churches and touring the buildings. Ideas and conversations have included ministries in each of the communities, children's programs, worship services, how to make our buildings and congregations welcoming to visitors, inclusiveness (Open and Affirming) as well as outreach and growth.

Rev. Julia Bratton, Alexandria, Rev. Dave Shephard, Gas City, and Rev. Donna Herring, Frankton took turns leading the group discussions and hosting the meetings. The group bonded rapidly and appreciated being able to learn from each other and share ideas. Many times as we worship and work in our home congregations, we can fall into patterns and keep looking at things and doing things the same old way. (Habits and Sacred Cows sometimes die hard.) Being able to brainstorm together and see things from new perspectives has truly been a gift.

Each church is now busily planning a new ministry project and has applied for a \$300 grant from the Indiana Region to help with the finances. Our group will be meeting again in April to see how plans are going. We have agreed to continue to encourage each other and hold each other accountable to follow through with our projects as well as share any frustrations. We also plan to celebrate our successes! With God's help we are hoping to have a positive impact for Christ in each of our respective communities! Pray for us, fellow Disciples, and look for a report this fall about how God has blessed our endeavors. †

Mbandaka before their move to Kinshasa. They fled the Democratic Republic of Congo in 2000 when family members loyal to the Mobutu regime were being persecuted by the then president, Laurent Kabila.

They became members of the Disciples' Church in Brazzaville where they were actively involved in church life. Pastor Jean Baptiste served as an evangelist throughout the country of Congo-Brazzaville as well as leading mission work in several countries in Central and Southern Africa. Before leaving Brazzaville, he pastored a church in a rural town approximately 62 miles from



Brazzaville and served as assistant pastor at the "mother" church in Brazzaville. Docta was in charge of development projects at church level for refugee families in Brazzaville. Most recently he was appointed Coordinator of the EDCC Health department.

Congregational Best Practices

Clergy Preaching and Teaching Stewardship

(Fall Day 1)

Creating compelling sermons on tithing and giving, stewardship as a holistic approach to managing God's resources, pastoral ethics and integrity in stewardship, outreach and missional giving, and leaving a legacy for future generations. This is designed for clergy only.

Congregational Fundraising

(Fall Day 2)

Finding alternate sources of income, creating a culture of generosity, effective use of building resources as a stream of income, creating green by going green, programs that pay, and cultivating and managing estate gifts. This is designed for the pastor, board chair, and treasurer (or two church appointed designees)

NOTE: Not all topics will be covered in each session. Consequently, it is imperative that the participants attend each session over a two year period
